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COMMUNITY ...

The Wikipedia definition of "community" is: "A community is a social unit (a group of living things) with commonality such as norms, religion, values, customs, or identity.

Communities may share a sense of place situated in a given geographical area (e.g. a country, village, town, or neighborhood) or in virtual space through communication platforms. Durable relations that extend beyond immediate genealogical ties also define a sense of community, important to their identity, practice, and roles in social institutions such as family, home, work, government, society, or humanity at large."

Discussions with other Salvatorians about our various collaborative or individual ministries certainly reinforce my commitment to teach the goodness and kindness of The Savior by all ways and means. After community gatherings, I feel that the "flame" has been rekindled. I feel energized.
